
Camping Les Castors

France, Marseille

Marseille is the second largest city in France according to population with 1,200,00 residents and was founded 2,600 years ago which also makes it the oldest city in France.

The city is full of art and culture and with its 26 centuries of history there is a wealth of monuments, museums and places of interest to visit from the Old port to the Saint-Victor Abbey to the Forteresses. It's a place of tranquil squares and stepped streets, bustling 19th-century avenues and souklike markets. At its heart is the Vieux Port, where fishmongers sell their daily catch along the boat-lined quayside. La Canebière, the main thoroughfare, runs east from here.

Marseille enjoys a splendid location in an outstanding natural environment, between the sea, the hills and the Calanques. These natural frontiers, the sea to the west and the encircling hills, have helped towards the emergence and creation of original places and landscapes. Half of the city's area is made up of natural spaces, with over 400 hectares of public parks and gardens.

There are plenty of self guided tours to see the sites or if you would like to discover Marseille from both traditional and more original angles take one of the many guided tours on offer.





Places to visit

Old Port of Marseille

Located at the end of the Canebiere. It has been the natural harbor of Marseille since antiquity and is now the main popular place in Marseille, mainly pedestrian since 2013.

In 600 BC, Greek settlers from Phocaea landed in the Lacydon, a rocky Mediterranean cove, now the site of the Old Port of Marseille. They set up a trading post or *emporion* in the hills on the northern shore. Until the nineteenth century the Old Port remained the centre of maritime activity in Marseille. In the Middle Ages the land at the far end of the port was used to cultivate hemp for the local manufacture of rope for mariners, which is the origin of the name of the main thoroughfare of Marseille, the Canebiere. The great St Victor's Abbey was gradually built between the third and ninth centuries on the hills to the south of the Old Port, on the site of a Hellenic burial ground.

Marseille Cathedral

Part of the earlier, much smaller cathedral still remains, alongside the new cathedral. It was built in the 12th century in a simple romanesque style. Two bays of the nave were demolished in the 1850s, when the new cathedral was built. What remains is the choir and one bay of the nave. It is commonly referred to as the "Vieille Major" The composer Charles Desmazures was organist at the old cathedral



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
